4-H Grows Plan

- Planning group involvement depends on individual counties but will include the 4-H Program Area Committee, Youth Leadership (County Council, Ambassadors) Adult Leadership (Adult Leaders, Booster Club) and other groups.
- The plan will be designed to support <u>program management</u>, <u>volunteer development</u>, and <u>leadership</u>.
- The plan will reflect defined strategies for <u>program marketing</u> and <u>membership growth</u>.

- Enhancing the **local quality experience**.

4-H Agriculture and Natural Resource Project Plan

- The ANR Project Coalition will provide program planning and volunteer development guidance.
- The **ANR Project Coalition Tool Kits**, with resources and sample agendas, are available for those who need to form a coalition.
- Agents are encouraged to use other grassroots groups, committees, or task forces as needed to support learning opportunities in livestock projects and other ANR projects outside of livestock.
- The plan will be designed to support and grow the 4-H ANR programs.



4-H Family and Community Health (FCH) Project Plan

- An FCH Project Coalition or Committee will provide **program planning** and **volunteer development guidance**.
- FCH Project Coalition/Committee **Tool Kit**, with resources and sample agendas, are available for those who need to form a coalition.
- The plan will be designed to **support and grow** the 4-H FCH project areas.

Program Planning: What You Need to Know

- Each county shall have a 4-H Program Area
 Committee. This group shall: identify local youth issues, build the county 4-H program through expansion and review, identify and secure resources and interpret and advocate. They will meet at least three times per year.
- Plans should be developed to address critical youth issues that have been identified in the county primarily by the 4-H Program Area Committee.
- impacts more than 500,000 students. by participating in 4-H, these students are statistically 5X more likely to graduate college, 4X more likely to actively contribute to their community, 3X more likely to be physically active, and 2X more likely to pursue a career in science, engineering, or computer-related fields.

Each year Texas 4-H

- Project Coalitions/task forces/committees to support ANR and FCH project areas should be active planning groups that meet at least two times a year. Depending on county staffing and program priorities, there may be a need for other focused project plans with a dedicated project coalition planning group.
- Each county shall implement 4-H Enrichment Curriculum projects in partnership with schools and in a classroom setting. These projects should be relevant to local youth issues and include 5 sequential learning experiences, each at least 30 minutes in length with a total of at least 2 hours of educational experiences. These projects may be included in a specific youth subject matter plan or they may be included in a separate outreach or in-depth plan.
- The bulk of the 4-H experience happens at the local level; therefore, it is important that youth are provided with a positive, high-quality club experience that will promote greater and long-term participation. In order to support 4-H club managers, counties should be utilizing the Enhancing the Club Experience resources available when training and providing support to 4-H club managers.
- Urban counties should have at least one plan focused on mobilizing volunteers to help implement your program plan.
